

31st October and 1st November 2020 : Solemnity of All Saints

“Do you know who these people are, dressed in white robes?”


Our Mass today takes us out of the routine cycle of Sunday celebrations and gives us a Solemnity of great joy, because we celebrate today all those in our Church who are now in glory in heaven. We believe that the Church exists here on earth (the Church Militant), in purgatory (the Church Expectant) and in heaven (the Church Triumphant). We may be in three different ‘places’ but we are all part of the mystical body of Christ, and so we are all brothers and sisters to each other. When we celebrate today’s Solemnity we therefore celebrate all those who have journeyed along the same path as us, but are further ahead; they have reached heaven, we are still moving towards heaven. Not only do we celebrate our brothers and sisters today, but we are also given a glimpse of the reality of heaven in our readings. Saint Matthew speaks of the characteristics of the Kingdom of Heaven when he speaks of the virtues of those who will be given admittance. An even clearer image is given in the first reading, from Saint John’s Revelation. This book is unique amongst the books of the bible because it is the only one which hasn’t happened yet – all the others are historical, but the Apocalypse is prophetic, telling us (in signs and wondrous language) what is to come. And so when Saint John sees a great multitude in white robes, standing around the Throne of



the Lamb, he is seeing us. If we stood where he is standing, and if our eyesight was good enough to pick out individual faces, we would be able to see ourselves (we pray) and all those we have known and loved, glorious in heaven at the end of time, standing around God's throne. This is the ultimate reality of our life's journey, and this is the cause of our rejoicing today.


November : A month of saints and sinners

These first days of November give us chance to reflect upon the meaning of life – and the reality of death. On Saturday night we might see one or two 'trick or treaters' in the street as Hallowe'en is commemorated. This isn't a particularly Christian festival in modern times, but its origins are in the eve of All Hallows, or all Saints Day on 1st November. Just as we have Christmas Eve and the Easter Vigil, so the night before the great solemnity of All Saints is marked by an outpouring of representations of those who have not yet reached heaven. Our modern interpretations of Hallowe'en, with ghosts and fake blood might be rather gory, but we are reminded that we live in a spiritual as well as a physical world. On Saturday night perhaps we could pray for those who do suffer, in this world, from painful situations that won't end until death intervenes: those on life support machines; those with terminal illnesses; those contemplating suicide. May they feel the love of Christ, who suffers with us, very close to them in their agonies.



Sunday 1st November, the Solemnity of All Saints, is a glorious feastday that shall one day (we pray) be our feast! We recall not only all the saints whose names are known to us, but also those who have in heaven and known only to God. First among them are the Holy Innocents, those countless children whose blood was shed by Herod as he searched for Christ in Bethlehem. Then those faithful men and women who died before Christ, and who were lead into eternal life by Christ when he descended into Hades from the Cross on Holy Saturday. Finally are all those of our brothers and sisters who have been washed clean in the blood of the Lamb, and who now enjoy the place reserved for them as Christ promised. We know the names of some of the saints, but many more are unknown. We pray that one day we will be among them in heaven for ever!

On Monday 2nd November we commemorate all the faithful departed, those who have died but who have not yet reached heaven, but await their final glory in



purgatory, making reparation for their sins and being purified to live with God. There is only one door out of purgatory, and it leads to heaven. But most of us aren't ready to spend eternity with God when we die, so we have purgatory as the opportunity to prepare for our final home in heaven. Let us surround all the soon-to-be-saints in purgatory with our prayers,

that they will enjoy the promises of Christ when they see him face to face.

November Dead List Envelopes are available at the back of each church. Take an envelope, put inside it a sheet with the names of those deceased family and friends whom you'd like to be remembered during Masses in November, add any offering you wish, and Mass will be celebrated for them during November and throughout the coming year.

Remembrance Sunday, 8th November, will see the 10.45am Mass in Calverton beginning with a Two Minute silence as we remember with thanks, and pray for in hope, all those who died during the two World Wars and all the other wars around the world since then. The Mass will be a Requiem Mass for all the war dead.

The Catholic Communications Network

Although World Communications Day is usually celebrated in May, we pray for the work of the Catholic Communications Network this Sunday and next, and a **Collection** will be taken for the work of the Network. Please help to continue this work through contributing generously to the collection.

A focus of our prayer might be to pray for all those professionals who work in communications, especially those who are responsible for communicating on behalf of the Catholic Church in this country. The communications office of the Catholic Bishops' Conference of England and Wales supports the bishops, in their witness and engagement with current issues, and the Church more widely in promoting the Gospel through digital, social, print and broadcast media. The office is the central point for media enquiries and is a key resource for national and international media professionals. It also plays an important role in developing the public profile of the Church through word and image.

During the present pandemic it's ever more vital to have a good media presence, in the press and on-line, to help all people 'with ears to hear' to come closer to knowledge of God's love for them.

Coming back to Mass

Many of our parishioners have come back to Mass, and even with the Government's 'rule of six' there is no change to our Mass routines: we can come to church with a maximum (including priest and stewards) of 20 in Southwell and 24 in Calverton.

To book a place telephone Kathleen and Robert Dixon on 01636 813874, at any reasonable time from Monday morning until Friday evening; if there's no reply leave a message, with your name and number, and they'll return your call. Please note:

- ✘ A place needs to be booked for each individual who plans to attend;
- ✘ You'll be asked to provide a telephone number, to be passed onto Public Health England if needed as part of the 'Test and Trace' system;
- ✘ For Sunday Masses bookings can be made only during the preceding week, from Monday morning, until Friday evening, running up to the Sunday Mass booked.

NHS Covid-19 App and the QR Code in Church

Along with most public buildings both of our churches and the parish hall now have their own QR code, situated just inside the door. If you have a smart-phone please scan the code as you come in, enabling you to 'check in' and assisting with the Government's Track and Trace system. Please note this is in addition to booking a place at Mass, and not instead – please continue to book for Mass as well!

What to expect when coming to Mass

In order to comply with the Bishop's guidelines on celebrating Masses in the covid-19 period there'll be some differences in that way we come to Mass and the way Mass is celebrated. Please follow these directions, and recognise that those asking you to follow the directions are volunteers themselves:

- ✘ Please don't attend if you show any symptoms of covid-19;
- ✘ Try to arrive no earlier than half an hour before Mass, and no later than ten minutes before Mass, to allow time for each person to enter one-by-one;
- ✘ Enter via the car park and follow the one-way signs, waiting by the 2 metre markers in front of the church door if others have arrived before you;
- ✘ Ensure you bring a mask to wear throughout the time in church, except when receiving Holy Communion;
- ✘ Please use the hand-sanitiser (provided) on arrival;

- ✘ Please take one of the Mass Sheets, and a Newsletter, and take them home with you after Mass;
- ✘ Put your weekly offering into the basket in the narthex; at present there are two collections as we're 'catching up' the second collections;
- ✘ There won't be any holy water available, the repository will be closed, and there are no Catholic papers currently available;
- ✘ Please sit on the seat to which you are directed, following the one-way system; seating is at two-metre intervals (in Southwell couples can sit next to each other, and families in a single pew; in Calverton the chairs have been laid out singularly);
- ✘ Please avoid any contact with other parishioners; don't speak unless necessary;
- ✘ Only the disabled toilet will be available for use, and only if absolutely necessary. If you do use the toilet, please do so before you are seated, and then go to your seat (in Southwell, by exiting the hall lobby, walking around the side of the church, and re-entering the church through the main door, following the one-way system);
- ✘ Windows and doors will be open to enable as much ventilation as possible;
- ✘ The Mass Sheet will explain the changes in the way Mass is celebrated, especially:
 - There will be no congregational singing;
 - Responses will be made with quiet voices;
 - There will be no ministries (eg altar servers, readers) during Mass;
 - There will be no sign of peace;
- ✘ After Mass you will be invited to receive Holy Communion; then exit the church following the one-way system, out into the car park, and leave immediately.
- ✘ Since it is not now permitted to gather publicly in groups of more than six, although we are exempt in church for Mass, groups of more than six in the church car park could be deemed to be breaking this restriction. Please ensure that you don't linger, tempting as it is to chat with fellow parishioners!
- ✘ As the weather becomes a little cooler please dress appropriately for the weather and temperature.

This is a lovely tradition in the Church, by which the prayers of the congregation are united to Christ's prayer on the Cross of Calvary. Pope Benedict XVI on Saints

*When Pope Benedict XVI visited this country ten years ago he met with young people and challenged them to respond to the **universal call to holiness** by recognising that God was calling each one of them, and indeed each one of us, to be a saint.*

“I hope that among those of you listening to me today there are some of the future saints of the twenty-first century. What God wants most of all for each one of you is that you should become holy. He loves you much more than you could ever begin to imagine, and he wants the very best for you. And by far the best thing for you is to grow in holiness.

Perhaps some of you have never thought about this before. Perhaps some of you think being a saint is not for you. Let me explain what I mean. When we are young, we can usually think of people that we look up to, people we admire, people we want to be like. It could be someone we meet in our daily lives that we hold in great esteem. Or it could be someone famous. We live in a celebrity culture, and young people are often encouraged to model themselves on figures from the world of sport or entertainment. My question for you is this: what are the qualities you see in others that you would most like to have yourselves? What kind of person would you really like to be?

When I invite you to become saints, I am asking you not to be content with second best. I am asking you not to pursue one limited goal and ignore all the others. Having money makes it possible to be generous and to do good in the world, but on its own, it is not enough to make us happy. Being highly skilled in some activity or profession is good, but it will not satisfy us unless we aim for something greater still. It might make us famous, but it will not make us happy. Happiness is something we all want, but one of the great tragedies in this world is that so many people never find it, because they look for it in the wrong places. The key to it is very simple – true happiness is to be found in God. We need to have the courage to place our deepest hopes in God alone, not in money, in a career, in worldly success, or in our relationships with others, but in God. Only he can satisfy the deepest needs of our hearts.”

News from Marriage Care

Our marriage preparation and support service enable couples to nurture faithful and fruitful marriages that last, as we draw on Catholic teaching and contemporary research to help couples focus on the quality of their relationship with each other.

Our latest resource, Preparing Together Anywhere, is facilitated by two trained volunteers via webcam. Groups of up to seven engaged couples attend three 90-minute sessions over a period of three weeks, with additional resources to enable couples to reflect more deeply in-between sessions on the commitment being entered into. Wedding plans may be on hold for some time, but couples need not put their preparation for marriage on hold.

Through our relationship counselling service (now available via webcam), we accompany, with compassion and practical wisdom, couples who find themselves in need of support on their journey. Because of the Coronavirus pandemic, we know that increases in family stress and impending threat of relationship breakdown will plunge many more into financial difficulties. We are unique in asking couples who come to us for counselling only to pay what they can afford, reflecting our commitment to support those most in need. Abortion in England and Wales

Tuesday marked the 53rd anniversary of the passing of the Abortion Act. The number of abortions performed in England and Wales has risen significantly since the government relaxed regulations so that women could terminate their pregnancies at home during the covid-19 pandemic. Figures from the Department of Health and Social Care show that 109,836 abortions were performed in the first half of 2020 – an increase of 4,296 on the same period last year. The figures follow a record high of 200,608 abortions for the whole of 2019. The rise comes after the government temporarily allowed “DIY” abortions, up to the tenth week of pregnancy, at home during lockdown. The measures allow women to receive both pills required for a termination at home after a phone consultation rather than a face-to-face clinic visit. The first pill, mifepristone, effectively starves the unborn baby by blocking the effects of the progesterone hormone, inducing a miscarriage. The second drug, misoprostol, is taken up to two days later and induces labour. Previously, the first pill would be taken under medical supervision.

The scheme has caused controversy, however. A leaked “urgent email” sent by a senior midwife at NHS England and NHS Improvement expressed concerns about the “escalating risks” of allowing at-home abortions. It said that two women had died after taking abortion pills at home and that a murder investigation had been launched into the death of a baby born alive after a woman took the pills when 28 weeks’ pregnant. Right to Life UK spokesperson Catherine Robinson called the figures a national tragedy. Every one of these abortions represents a failure of our society to protect the lives of babies in the womb and a failure to offer full support to women with unplanned pregnancies. “This year we’ve come together as a nation and made great sacrifices to protect the vulnerable from covid-19. Sadly, at the very same time as protecting one group of vulnerable people, we as society have also ended thousands of young vulnerable lives through abortion.”
