

27th and 28th March 2021: Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord

Over the season of Lent we have reflections prepared by clergy of Nottingham Diocese to help us reflect on each Sunday's readings.

It is likely that Jesus rode on a donkey many times during his life in Nazareth and during his ministry. His entry into Jerusalem was, however, something special. I'm reminded of him riding towards his entry into the world, by tradition on a donkey, in his mother's womb. Today, the Lord rides towards his entry into the glory of the Cross, for the moment surrounded by cheering and waving crowds laying cloaks on the road before him. "Blessings on the coming kingdom of our father David!"





Here was a Saviour coming to free them, like the great Jewish commanders of the past, such as Gideon and Barak, Mattathias and Judas Maccabaeus. No doubt they remembered the prophecy of Zechariah: "Shout with gladness...see now your king comes to you; he is victorious, triumphant, humble and riding on a donkey, on a colt the foal of a donkey."

And then.....Nothing. Jesus disappears from the city. The crowd has been let down; he was just another impostor after all. The next they see of him, he has been arrested presumably for

pretending to be the Saviour, the great liberator. So, the people bay for his blood, the ultimate punishment, not just a life sentence but the death penalty.

They can't understand that his kingdom is not of this world. And very often, nor can we. Perhaps our own material expectations are sometimes dashed and we, like most of the disciples, hide in the crowd, bewildered and uncomprehending.

Jesus then was led to his death. Crucifixion was the common form, a combination of torture and a lingering death. In the end, to most onlookers, Jesus' crucifixion was a bit disappointing. Nothing special happened.

But at the foot of the Cross, were Mary his mother and several women with John the beloved disciple. The gospel writers record the recollections of those closest to Jesus, their experience of Jesus lifted high, with the glory that shone from him despite his agony, the glory of divine love and forgiveness. Even the centurion was moved.

To the repentant thief Jesus promised paradise. Lovingly concerned for his Blessed Mother, he commended her to the care of John and to the veneration of us all. Even in his dereliction and feeling of being abandoned, he spoke words of forgiveness to those complicit in his passion and death: "Father forgive them, they do not understand what they are doing."

Those wonderful words of loving mercy are also for us, as day by day, we fail to live the life of the gospel in so many ways. "Father, forgive them." It's God's love, so amazing, so undeserved, that it brings tears to your eyes.

The Lord's final words, recorded by Saint John, are words of victory: "It is accomplished!" Divine love had conquered evil and death.

The rest (for the moment) is silence.

The Great Week in 2021

Thankfully we're able to come to Mass if we feel it's safe to do so: the stringent lockdown of Holy Week 2020 with no public worship permitted has been eased. Booking to come to church: Holy Week and Easter 2021



Parishioners are very welcome to book for any of the Masses and Solemn Liturgy, on a first come, first served basis. Please note in particular the days from which bookings will be taken. There is no limit to the number of times an individual can come to church over the Great Week, but in order to maximise the chances of more individuals being able to attend at least one of the Week's events, bookings will be taken on different days for the different Masses and Solemn Liturgy.

Please note, too, that there will be some changes to the ways in which the Masses and Solemn Liturgy are celebrated this year to make sure that they're as safe as possible and that we comply with the ovid-19 precautions. In particular, alongside the prohibition on congregational singing in church, we're encouraged to celebrate the Services in a prayerful and dignified way whilst at the same time reducing the amount of time individuals are in the church building. Fuller details are given in the middle pages about what this means for each event, but if you have any specific questions please contact Father Simon directly.

Many thanks to Kathleen and Robert Dixon who are managing the bookings, and who will be able to advise of alternatives should the particular Service you wish to attend be already fully booked. The capacity for each church remains unchanged: 16 (and three stewards) in Southwell, and 20 (and three stewards) in Calverton. Many thanks too to the stewards who continue to help with the cleaning of the churches and marshalling of the congregation at each Mass; a particular thanks to those stewards from Calverton who are coming to Southwell to help, thus ensuring that we're able to celebrate even a minimum number of Liturgies there.

The arrangements for booking for the different Services are:

- ▼ Thursday 1st April, Calverton, 7.30pm Mandatum Mass of the Lord's Supper bookings in the usual way from 8.30am on Monday 29th March.
- ▼ Friday 2nd April, Calverton, 3.00pm **Solemn Celebration of the Lord's Passion** bookings in the usual way from 8.30am on Tuesday 30th March.
- ► Saturday 3rd April, Southwell, 9.00pm **Solemn Vigil and First Mass of Easter** bookings in the usual way from 8.30am on Wednesday 31st March.
- ▼ Sunday 4th April, Calverton, 11.00am Mass of Easter Day bookings in the usual way from 8.30am on Monday 29th March.

Coming to Mass

Even in the current national lockdown public Mass is available on Saturday in Southwell at 6.00pm and on Sunday in Calverton at 10.45am. Being in a national lockdown we are precluded from any social interaction in or at church (outside of our bubble), but we can come to church with a maximum (including priest and stewards) of 20 people in Southwell and 24 people in Calverton.

To book a place telephone Kathleen and Robert Dixon on 01636 813874, at any reasonable time from 8.30am Monday morning until 4.30pm Friday afternoon; if there's no reply leave a message with your name and number, or try ringing again a few minutes later. Don't use any other number to contact Kathleen and Robert, and please also note:

- ♣ A place needs to be booked for each individual who plans to attend;
- ➤ You'll be asked to provide a telephone number, to be passed onto Public Health England if needed as part of the 'Test and Trace' system;
- Sunday Masses bookings can be made during the preceding week only.

What to expect when coming to Mass

In order to comply with the Bishop's guidelines on celebrating Masses in the covid-19 period there'll be some differences in that way we come to Mass and the way Mass is celebrated. Please follow these directions, and recognise that those asking you to follow the directions are volunteers themselves:

- ₱ Please don't attend if you show any symptoms of covid-19;
- ▼ Try to arrive no earlier than half an hour before Mass, and no later than ten minutes before Mass, to allow time for each person to enter one-by-one;
- ⚠ Enter via the car park and follow the one-way signs, waiting by the 2 metre markers in front of the church door if others have arrived before you;
- ♣ Ensure you bring a mask to wear throughout the time in church, except when receiving Holy Communion; the mask should be worn so as to fully and snugly cover the wearer's mouth and nose;
- ₱ Please use the hand-sanitiser (provided) on arrival;
- ♣ Please take one of the Mass Sheets, and a Newsletter, and take them home with you after Mass;
- ▶ Put your weekly offering into the basket in the narthex;
- ★ There won't be any holy water available, the repository will be closed, and there are no Catholic papers currently available;

- ♣ Please sit on the seat to which you are directed, following the one-way system; seating is at two-metre intervals (in Southwell couples can sit next to each other, and families in a single pew; in Calverton the chairs have been laid out singularly);
- ➡ Please avoid any contact with other parishioners; don't speak unless necessary;
- ▶ Only the disabled toilet will be available for use, and only if absolutely necessary. If you do use the toilet, please do so before you are seated, and then go to your seat (in Southwell, by exiting the hall lobby, walking around the side of the church, and re-entering the church through the main door, following the one-way system);
- ₩ Windows and some doors will be open to enable as much ventilation as possible;
- ★ The Mass Sheet will explain the changes in the way Mass is celebrated, especially:
 - There will be no congregational singing;
 - Responses will be made with quiet voices;
 - o There will be no ministries (eg altar servers, readers) during Mass;
 - There will be no sign of peace;
- ♣ After Mass you will be invited to receive Holy Communion; then exit the church following the one-way system, out into the car park, and leave immediately.
- ▼ Since it is not permitted to gather publicly please ensure that you don't linger in the car park after Mass, tempting as it is to chat with fellow parishioners!
- As the weather is now cooler please dress appropriately for the weather and temperature.

NHS Covid-19 App and the QR Code in Church

If you have a smart-phone please scan the QR code as you come in to either church, enabling you to 'check in' and assisting with the Government's Track and Trace system. Please note this is in addition to booking a place at Mass, and not instead – please continue to book for Mass as well!

Never permit me to be separated from you. Amen.

Prayer during the Coronavirus Pandemic

O Mary, you shine continuously on our journey as a sign of salvation and hope. We entrust ourselves to you, Health of the Sick. At the foot of the Cross you participated in Jesus' pain, with steadfast faith. You, Salvation of the Roman People, know what we need. We are certain that you will provide, so that, as you did at Cana of Galilee, joy and feasting might return after this moment of trial. Help us, Mother of Divine Love, to conform ourselves to the Father's will and to do what Jesus tells us: He who took our sufferings upon Himself, and bore our sorrows to bring us, through the Cross, to the joy of the Resurrection. Amen.

We seek refuge under your protection, O Holy Mother of God. Do not despise our pleas – we who are put to the test and deliver us from every danger, O glorious and blessed Virgin. Amen.

Year of Saint Joseph



Although we don't hear of Saint Joseph in the liturgies of Holy Week (the Church's tradition is that he died before Jesus' public ministry) we can be sure that in his humanity Jesus learned from his earthly Father those virtues of obedience to God and love for others which are at the

heart of his decision to submit to arrest in the garden on Maundy Thursday and to crucifixion and death on the Cross on Good Friday.

A reflection for Holy Week from Saint Augustine of Hippo

Let us too glory in the cross of the Lord. The passion of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ is the hope of glory and a lesson in patience. What may not the hearts of believers promise themselves as the gift of God's grace, when for their sake God's only Son, co-eternal with the Father, was not content only to be born as man from human stock but even died at the hands of the men he had created?

It is a great thing that we are promised by the Lord, but far greater is what has already been done for us, and which we now commemorate. Where were the sinners, what were they, when Christ died for them? When Christ has already given us the gift of his death, who is to doubt that he will give the saints the gift of his own life? Why does our human frailty hesitate to believe that mankind will one day live with God?

Who is Christ if not the Word of God: in the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God? This Word of God was made flesh and dwelt among us. He had no power of himself to die for us: he had to take from us our mortal flesh. This was the way in which, though immortal, he was able to die; the way in which he chose to give life to mortal men: he would first share with us, and then enable us to share with him. Of ourselves we had no power to live, nor did he of himself have the power to die. In other words, he performed the most wonderful exchange with us. Through us, he died; through him, we shall live.

The death of the Lord our God should not be a cause of shame for us; rather, it should be our greatest hope, our greatest glory. In taking upon himself the death that he found in us, he has most faithfully promised to give us life in him, such as we cannot have of ourselves.

He loved us so much that, sinless himself, he suffered for us sinners the punishment we deserved for our sins. How then can he fail to give us the reward we deserve for our righteousness, for he is the source of righteousness? How can he, whose promises are true, fail to reward the saints when he bore the punishment of sinners, though without sin himself?

Brethren, let us then fearlessly acknowledge, and even openly proclaim, that Christ was crucified for us; let us confess it, not in fear but in joy, not in shame but in glory. The apostle Paul saw Christ, and extolled his claim to glory. He had many great and inspired things to say about Christ, but he did not say that he boasted in Christ's wonderful works: in creating the world, since he was God with the Father, or in ruling the world, though he was also a man like us. Rather, he said: Let me not boast except in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ.

All the priests of the diocese are invited to gather around the Bishop at this Mass, in which Bishop Patrick asks priests to renew their commitment to ministry, and then blesses the oil of the sick and the oil of catechumens, before consecrating the Sacred Chrism. These oils, and the Sacred Chrism, will be used in the administration of the sacraments over the coming year (oil of catechumens and Sacred Chrism at baptism; Sacred Chrism at confirmation and ordination; oil of the sick at Anointing of the Sick).

This Mass, celebrated on Maundy Thursday (or slightly earlier in Holy Week, depending on circumstances) in all the Cathedrals of the world, celebrates the unity of each diocese, each particular Church, around the Bishop, the leader and shepherd of that Church. We might pray this day especially for Bishop Patrick and his ministry of shepherding the people of Nottingham Diocese, through governing, teaching and offering the sacraments for us.

How to make a Palm Cross

Whilst the Palm is the symbol of triumphant entry on Palm Sunday, the Cross is the symbol of death on Good Friday. Some Catholics like to shape their 'straight' palm into a Cross at the end of Holy Week and keep it in their home throughout the year.

Supplies: One palm leaf strip about 24-26" in length, 1/2" in width, tapering to the end.
