10th and 11th July 2021: Fifteenth Sunday of the Year

Were today not a Sunday it would be the feast of Saint Benedict, patron of Europe, and the founder of monasticism in the Church. The influence of the order he founded, the Benedictines, has been felt throughout Europe in the 1600 years since his death, with his emphasis of putting Christ before everything. We might consider this week part of The Rule he wrote for his monks, which is still in use today:

Whenever you begin any good work you should first of all make a most pressing appeal to Christ our Lord to bring it to perfection; that he, who has honoured us by counting us among his children, may never be grieved by our evil deeds. For we must always serve him with the good things he has given us in such a way that he may never – as an angry father disinherits his sons or even like a master who inspires fear – grow impatient with our sins and consign us to everlasting punishment, like wicked

servants who would not follow him to glory.

So we should at long last rouse ourselves, prompted by the words of Scripture: Now is the time for us to rise from sleep. Our eyes should be open to the God-given light, and we should listen in wonderment to the message of the divine voice as it daily cries out: Today, if you shall hear his voice, harden not your hearts; and again: If anyone has ears to hear, let him listen to what the Spirit is saying to the churches. And what does the Spirit say? Come my sons, listen to me; I will teach you the fear of the Lord. Hurry, while you have the light of life, so that death's darkness may not overtake you.



And the Lord as he seeks the one who will do his work among the throng of people to whom he makes that appeal, says again: Which of you wants to live to the full; who loves long life and the enjoyment of prosperity? And, if when you hear this you say, I do, God says to you: If you desire true and everlasting life, keep your tongue from evil and your lips from deceit; turn away from evil and do good; seek peace and pursue it. And when you have done these things my eyes will be upon you and my ears will be attentive to your prayers; and before you call upon my name I shall say to you: Behold, I am here. What could be more delightful, dearest brothers, than the voice of our Lord's invitation to us? In his loving kindness he reveals to us the way of life.

And so, girded with faith and the performance of good works, let us follow in his paths by the guidance of the Gospel; then we shall deserve to see him who has called us into his kingdom. If we wish to attain a dwelling-place in his kingdom we shall not reach it unless we hasten there by our good deeds.

Just as there exists an evil fervour, a bitter spirit, which divides us from God and leads us to hell, so there is a good fervour which sets us apart from evil inclinations and leads us towards God and eternal life. Monks should put this fervour into practice with an overflowing love: that is, they should *surpass each other in mutual esteem*, accept their weaknesses, either of body or of behaviour, with the utmost patience; and vie with each other in acceding to requests. No one should follow what he considers to be good for himself, but rather what seems good for another. They should display brotherly love in a chaste manner; fear God in a spirit of love; revere their abbot with a genuine and submissive affection. Let them put Christ before all else; and may he lead us all to everlasting life.

We pray for the Benedictine Communities across the world, and especially the Benedictine Hermits (Father David and Father Richard) in our deanery, in Elston.

Masses this week

Weekday Masses are now being celebrated publicly, and without the need to book, in both Our Lady of Victories church in Southwell and Saint Anthony church in Calverton. Sea Sunday: 11th July

Every year churches around the world celebrate Sea Sunday. It is a day for people to come together to pray for seafarers and fishers, and thank them for the vital role they play in all of our lives.

Seafarers are extremely important to this country. 90% of goods that come here arrive by ship. That is much of the food we eat, the equipment in our hospitals, our phones, cars, petrol, just about everything. Seafarers work long shifts, seven days a week, often for nine months at a time. In these times of pandemic, many haven't been home for over a year. They are far away from their family and loved ones, always at sea or a stranger in a foreign land.

And what happens when something goes wrong? When they are exploited or abused? When they are abandoned by their employer or their wages unpaid? This was the case for Jimaster, a 22 year-old seafarer who got stranded in Uruguay during the pandemic. He had joined a fishing vessel when his father died, so that he could provide for his family. But his wages had never been paid and he was confined to his ship, with only a small amount of rice to eat and limited water. The temperature dropped and he had no winter clothing. Two of the crew came down with a fever and he thought he would die. But a Stella Maris chaplain came to the ship with food, clothes, phone cards, and medical supplies. The chaplain worked with the port authorities and ship owners and eventually managed to get Jimaster home to his family in the Philippines. He believes that, without Stella Maris, he would most likely be dead. For hundreds of seafarers like Jimaster, a ship visit from Stella Maris provides critical support.

Stella Maris chaplains and volunteers are working in ports up and down this country and across the world. This weekend they will be out visiting seafarers as usual. They welcome the stranger, in line with Jesus's instruction in today's Gospel. In the good times, they provide seafarers with faith resources, warm clothing, SIM cards so they can talk to their families back home, and help them to get to confession or Mass, or to the local shops. And in the bad times, as in Jimaster's case, they do so much more. But they can't do it without support. Our prayers and generous donations ensure Stella Maris can continue to welcome the strangers in our ports, and be there for seafarers like Jimaster when they need assistance. You can help in two ways.

This Sunday we remember Stella Maris – formerly the Apostleship of the Sea in our prayers.

We also have a collection at Masses this Sunday and next Sunday to support their work – many thanks in anticipation of your generosity!

Coming to Mass

In the current partial lockdown public Mass is available on Saturday in Southwell at 6.00pm and on Sunday in Calverton at 10.45am. Currently we are precluded from social interaction in church (outside of our bubble), and recommended not to linger too long outside of church. We can come to church with a maximum (including priest and stewards) of 24 people in Southwell and 30 people in Calverton.

To book a place telephone Kathleen and Robert Dixon on 01636 813874, at any reasonable time from 8.30am Monday morning until 4.30pm Friday afternoon; if there's no reply leave a message with your name and number, or try ringing again a few minutes later. Don't use any other number to contact Kathleen and Robert, and please also note:

- ♣ A place needs to be booked for each individual who plans to attend;
- ★ You'll be asked to provide a telephone number, to be passed onto Public Health England if needed as part of the 'Test and Trace' system;
- Sunday Masses bookings can be made during the preceding week only.

What to expect when coming to Mass

In order to comply with the Bishop's guidelines on celebrating Masses in the covid-19 period there'll be some differences in that way we come to Mass and the way Mass is celebrated. Please follow these directions, and recognise that those asking you to follow the directions are volunteers themselves:

- ₱ Please don't attend if you show any symptoms of covid-19;
- ▼ Try to arrive no earlier than half an hour before Mass, and no later than ten minutes before Mass, to allow time for each person to enter one-by-one;
- ♣ Enter via the car park and follow the one-way signs, waiting at two metre distances in front of the church door if others have arrived before you;
- ♣ Ensure you bring a mask to wear throughout the time in church, except when
 receiving Holy Communion; the mask should be worn so as to fully and snugly
 cover the wearer's mouth and nose;
- ₱ Please use the hand-sanitiser (provided) on arrival;
- ₹ Please take one of the Mass Sheets, and a Newsletter, and take them home with you after Mass;
- ♣ Put your weekly offering into the basket in the narthex;
- ★ There won't be any holy water available, the repository will be closed, and there are no Catholic papers currently available;

- ♣ Please sit on the seat to which you are directed, following the one-way system; seating is at two-metre intervals (in Southwell couples can sit next to each other, and families in a single pew; in Calverton the chairs have been laid out singularly);
- ♣ Please avoid any contact with other parishioners; don't speak unless necessary;
- ♣ Only the disabled toilet will be available for use, and only if absolutely necessary. If you do use the toilet, please do so before you are seated, and then go to your seat (in Southwell, by exiting the hall lobby, walking around the side of the church, and re-entering the church through the main door, following the one-way system);
- ₩ Windows and some doors will be open to enable as much ventilation as possible;
- ★ The Mass Sheet will explain the changes in the way Mass is celebrated, especially:
 - There will be no congregational singing;
 - Responses will be made with quiet voices;
 - o There will be no ministries (eg altar servers, readers) during Mass;
 - There will be no sign of peace;
- After Mass you will be invited to receive Holy Communion; then exit the church following the one-way system, out into the car park, and leave immediately.
- ♣ Please don't linger too long, or with too many others, in the car park after Mass, tempting as it is to chat with fellow parishioners!
- ♣ Please dress appropriately for the weather and temperature, noting that the necessary ventilation in church can produce draughts.

NHS Covid-19 App and the QR Code in Church

If you have a smart-phone please scan the QR code as you come in to either church, enabling you to 'check in' and assisting with the Government's Track and Trace system. Please note this is in addition to booking a place at Mass, and not instead – please continue to book for Mass as well!

A Letter from Bishop Patrick

Last Sunday this letter was read at Masses across our deanery:



1st July 2021

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Over the past two years, parishes and deaneries across the diocese have been engaged in a consultation. It has focussed on future arrangements for parishes to work together and to be more outward facing, more engaged with the wider community, while recognising that there are now fewer priests to serve the parishes, schools, hospitals and other chaplaincies. Thank you to everyone who has been involved in leading that consultation, and to all those who contributed with their thoughts and suggestions.

Having considered carefully all the submissions from your parish and deanery, and after discussing these with your clergy and other leaders in the diocese, I have come to a decision about the future of your parish and the wider deanery area. I wish to set out now each element of the decision that affects you and that wider area.

- At the beginning of September Father Paul Smith at Saint Philip Neri, Mansfield, and Father Paul Nellikulam at Saint Patrick, Forest Town, will both leave to take up new appointments.
- 2. Father John Kyne at Saint Philip Neri will be joined by a new Assistant Priest, Father Marc Besana, who is from the diocese of Capiz in the Philippines, but now ministering in our diocese. Together, they will work with the people in the parishes to serve the communities of Saint Philip Neri, Mansfield, Saint Patrick, Forest Town, Saint Joseph, Shirebrook, and Saint Therese, Market Warsop. So Father John will also become the Parish Priest of Saint Patrick.
- 3. The churches of Saint Bernadette, Bolsover, and Saint George, Rainworth, have been closed for use over the past 18 months and they will not reopen.
- 4. The community of Saint Joseph, New Ollerton, will be served from Holy Trinity, Newark. Canon Michael O'Donoghue and Father Peter Ingman at Holy Trinity will be joined by a third priest to assist them.
- 5. Father Simon Gillespie, Parish Priest of Our Lady of Victories, Southwell, and

Saint Anthony, Calverton, will leave to take up a new appointment. Our Lady of Victories will be served by the clergy based at Holy Trinity, Newark, and Saint Anthony will be served by Canon Philip Ziomek at Good Shepherd, Woodthorpe.

6. Canon Michael O'Donoghue will also be the Parish Priest of Our Lady of Victories and Saint Anthony until such a time that these two places of worship can be formally joined to Holy Trinity and Good Shepherd respectively.

This will mean that Father Paul Nellikulam at Saint Patrick and Father Simon Gillespie at Our Lady of Victories will not be replaced with another resident priest.

These changes will come into effect for the weekend of 4th / 5th September 2021.

I realise this news may come as a shock to come of you, but the changes are based on the ideas and suggestions that emerged during the consultation. They are designed to try and ensure that, given the shortage of priests, the pastoral needs of every community can continue to be well served, and to encourage the different communities to work together for the benefit of the areas they serve. Every community affected is being given the same information this weekend, to help you to recognise that the changes affecting your community are part of a much bigger picture and plan for the future pastoral provision across our diocese.

In the next six to 12 months we will need to consider carefully the future of the church buildings of Saint Bernadette in Bolsover and Saint George in Rainworth, and the presbyteries at Saint Patrick, Forest Town, and Our Lady of Victories, Southwell. For now, the most important thing is to assure you that each community will continue to be well served by the clergy and team appointed to each place of worship. Please pray for them and give them your wholehearted support.

I wish to thank everyone concerned for their willingness to make these changes happen, and my prayer is that we will all come to recognise the need for these changes, which are not made lightly, and do our best to make them work in the service of Christ Jesus, Our Lord and Master.

You remain always in my prayer; please keep me in yours.

Fundraising for Alzheimer's Research

At the end April 2021 Peter Thomas signed-up to an initiative called 'The Treble Challenge Running Down Dementia' where he pledged to running 150 kilometres by 31st August to fundraise for Alzheimer's Research. This charity is dear to both his and his wife Christine's hearts as three of their parents died from dementia.
